A PUZZLER LOOKS AT CRITICISM Ву НОНО

We puzzlers are fortunate in that we are perpetually delving into dictionaries, and so are making fine distinction between words that have certain resemblance in meaning, as well as certain differences.

To say that this should improve the quality of the thinking process, follows. Thoughts are composed of words, like buildings are composed of bricks. To have thoughts that do not consist of words is to have emotions, vaguenesses, and other less communicable states of mind. Hence, puzzlers should do pretty well in their thinking, say, well above the average of the community, provided they keep their emotional content down.

Suppose we try to follow a person's criticism by analyzing what it consists of. First, let us assume there is a subject of the thought. Second, there is the thinker. While the subject may remain constant, say, a painting, an article, a book, a poem, a play or a concert recording, the thinker is a variable, depending upon who the thinker is. Tom brings to the play his inherited abilities plushis acquired abilities, or in short, his own mind. Dick, on the other hand, brings his set of mental traits to the play. It will follow most likely, that Tom and Dick will not
