#### NPL CONVENTION ATTENDANCE by Willz

Modern NPL convention-goers may be surprised to learn that attendance of 100+ members is historically far from the norm. The first convention in New York City in 1883 had 28 attendees, and thereafter the number tended to range between 15 and 25. At least eight early conventions had attendance in the single digits, the nadir being five, in Atlantic City in July 1913.

The conventions before the 1920s would hardly be recognizable to NPLers today. They were one-day affairs, usually at a rented hall, and usually consisting entirely of a business meeting, at which reports would be read, issues debated, and elections held. It's not surprising so few people would attend.

In the 1920s the affairs expanded to two or three days, and entertainments and excursions were added to the program. Occasionally there would be puzzle competitions — although nothing like the extended puzzle and game sessions we have today. Attendance picked up. During the 1920s and '30s it averaged about 75. The peak was 165, in Philadelphia in September 1938. Conventions in those days were held twice a year, over Washington's Birthday and Labor Day weekends.

During W.W. II the conventions were halted. When they resumed in 1946, they never got back their former strength. Partly this was due to the NPL's membership, which was both shrinking and aging. The attendance highs during this period were 71 in Boston in 1947 and 43 in New York in 1948, and the numbers slid from there. The convention frequency dropped as well, from twice to once a year, starting in 1955. The last two conventions of the old era, in Wilmington, Del. (1957), and Pasadena, Calif. (1958), had just 12 and 11 members, respectively. The 1958 attendees were all locals.

I joined the League in 1972, and Helene (then known as Ginger Ella) in 1973. Together, as friends, we decided to restart the conventions, this time with a full program of word games, puzzles, and entertainments, and a business meeting as brief as possible. Helene hosted the event in her hometown of Princeton, and I directed the program. Twenty-five members and five guests came.

Since then the conventions have continued annually, with the attendance growing considerably, as shown by the chart below. There have now been 17 conventions in a row in which more than 100 members have attended, with no diminution of interest in sight.


#### **JULY AFTERNOTES**

The text was broken into four rows and the characters in each column were then sorted vertically. See example at right.



Non-MW words are noted. "+" signifies foreign, slang, dialect, obsolete, archaic, and the like. Capitalized words get a "\*". Words that are capitalized (as in names, titles) but normally uncapitalized with the same usage get a "^". Enumeration for MW phrases is [bracketed] in anagrams and flat types where non-MW phrases are allowed, spoonergrams, mutations. palindromes, rebuses, heteronyms and homonyms, variations on these types, and flats labeled "freewheeling."


