Non-MW words are noted. “+” signifies foreign, slang, dialect, obsolete, archaic, and the like. Capitalized words get a “*”. Words that are capitalized (as in names, titles) but normally uncapitalized with the same usage get a “^”. Enumeration for MW phrases is [bracketed] in anagrams and flat types where non-MW phrases are allowed, to wit: spoonergrams, mutations, palindromes, rebuses, heteronyms and homonyms, variations on these types, and flats labeled “freewheeling.”

The omitted letters spell a possible reason for your misfortune (or draw lines joining them in the grid to get the picture). The six extra words might help, but if not, the extra letters will provide a clue for the starting square of a four-word phrase in the completed grid (making two 90-degree turns) which will definitely solve your problem soon.

For complete credit, include all of the following: the completed grid, either or both of the solutions associated with the missing letters, the 6 extra words (in a meaningful way), the phrase associated with the extra letters and the four-word phrase found in the completed grid.

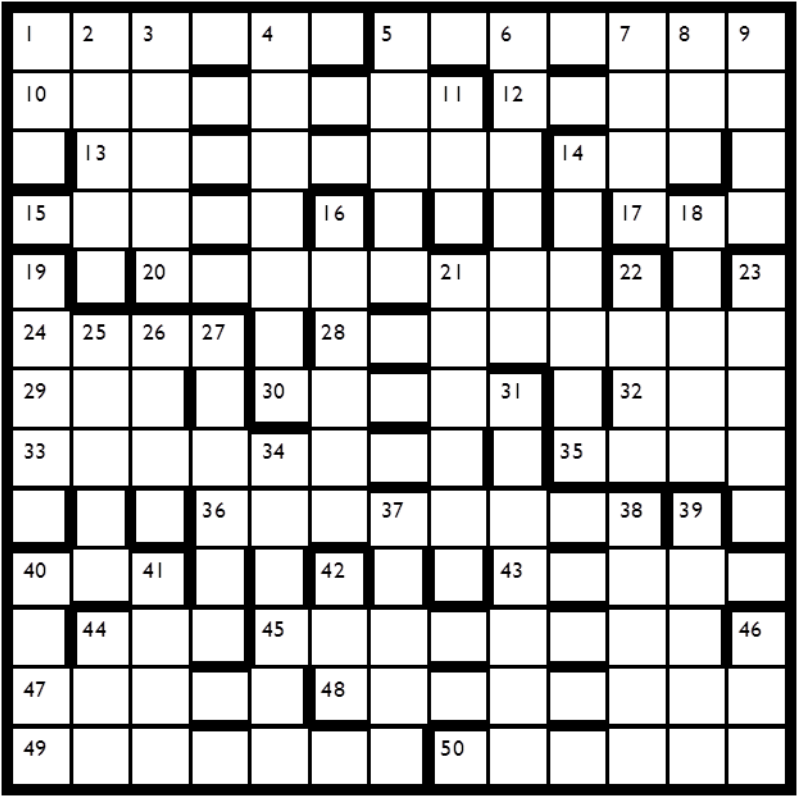
