From the Golden Sphinx Committee

We're very excited to present this inaugural *Enigma* supplemental issue containing all of last year's Golden Sphinx nominees. We hope you enjoy seeing these excellent puzzles, whether it's a reminder of your solving from last year, or it's for the first time.

The Enigma depends on puzzle contributions from the membership. Year after year the talent and generosity of the many contributors is on display. The Krewe has always been eager to recognize these contributions, as evidenced by the longstanding tradition of giving kudos to individual puzzles, and of tabulating these kudos in the solving report once the year is over. Starting in 2015 (for *Enigma* year 2014), the Golden Sphinxes were an attempt to take this concept even further, by conducting a "black-tie" ceremony (well, at least Teki was in black tie!) at the con banquet to honor exceptional contributors to *The Enigma*. We were very grateful to have Dart step forward and create a beautiful design for the pins, which are small but sincere tokens of our appreciation to the constructors.

From the beginning, the committee has struggled with how to select a few awardees from the many prolific and much-loved constructors from the previous year. Early on we settled on the concept that the awards would be for the favorite puzzles from the previous years; after all, the Krewe had already kudoed their favorite puzzles. However, we quickly ran into some doubts about using straight kudos counts. The main problem was that some types of puzzles have very shallow kudos profiles, with many puzzles sharing the same kudos count. In addition, there is variability in overall kudos between months, and it's hard to say that a 12-kudos puzzle in January, would not prevail head-to-head with a 13-kudos puzzle in December. We also liked the idea of giving the puzzles a "second life" by creating a curated list of top favorites and allowing the Krewe to review them once more and vote on them. In the end, we settled on a process whereby the committee starts with the top 10-ish kudos-earners in each category from the solving report; committee members vote on the

puzzles to winnow to the top 5 (with any committee member who is nominated in a category abstaining from the category); a curated list of these “nominees” is published; the Krewe votes on the nominees and the top n winners in each category are selected.

We hope that this supplemental issue will make it easier to review and enjoy all of the nominees. We look forward to your votes, and to bestowing the awards at this year’s con, in whatever form it takes.

Most of all, our deepest appreciation for all of the 2019 puzzle contributors — your talent and generosity of spirit are what keeps *The Enigma* going. A special thanks to yodaughter, who could have hit us over the head when we broached the idea of a special issue, but instead got excited about all the extra work she would do. Also thanks to Teki for editing all the 2019 puzzles, Quicks?lver for compiling the kudos, Qoz for putting the online voting onto the website, and \$8.90 for helpful info during this process.

From the Composer

Puzzles types are presented in the same order as in *The Enigma*. The puzzles themselves are laid out so as to fit the space and do not reflect any particular ranking. In each regular issue, cryptograms are on the back page, numbered 1 through 7 by estimated difficulty, and they are presented in that way here. Extras changed from being lettered X to E midway through 2019.

Each member can vote for their one favorite puzzle in each category; it's possible to abstain from one or more categories if desired. Please vote online at <https://krewe.puzzlers.org/sphinxes>.

If you don't want to vote online, please write a list of each nominee you are voting for and its category (limit one vote per category; abstentions are possible). Send the list to Sue++ (Susan Glass, 12 Shady Ln, Framingham MA 01701). Please be sure to include your nom so that we can verify the vote.

The deadline for voting by either method is June 30, 2020, midnight Pacific time; for mail-in votes this means the ballot must be received by then.

PUZZLE NOTES

June F-6. In Quantum Squares, the same set of clues leads to the solutions of two different squares. Solvers had to submit solutions to both squares for credit.

Nov F-14. This is not a Guide form. The shape is designed for this issue. Solve as a 15x15 diagramless with left/right symmetry (and 3-letter word minimum waived) or use the online grid.

Apr RX-1. LeXman

Nov E-7. In an ALTERNATING ANAQUOTE, a quote is split alternately into N-grams of two different lengths. The N-grams of each length are then grouped by length and given in alphabetical order. As an aid to the solver, the first N-gram comes from the first group.

Sep X-1: Crax/Trazom. This cryptic was presented at the March 2019 Equinox Party in Berkeley, and was inspired by Cryptictionary 2017 by 530nm330Hz and Tortoise, presented at BeaCon (Boston, 2017) and based on a version invented by nmHz for a Boston mini-con the year before.

May C-4. DZE = not MW; MPIY = non-MW usage. Solvers had to submit the answer to this riddle along with the plaintext. When you solve the crypt, the thing in its issue which it refers to is YRKZNA (rot-13).



NOMINEES

Solution words and phrases not found in 11C (11th Collegiate) are labeled for the most recent Merriam-Webster dictionary in which they appear: NI3, online MW (www.merriam-webster.com), or NI2. Non-MW words and usages are noted.

“+” signifies foreign, slang, dialect, obsolete, archaic, and the like. Capitalized words get a “*”. Words that are capitalized (as in names or titles) but normally uncapitalized with the same usage get a “^”.

Enumeration for MW phrases is [bracketed] in anagrams and flat types where non-MW phrases are allowed, to wit: spoonergrams, mutations, palindromes, rebuses, heteronyms and homonyms, welded flats, variations on these types, and flats labeled “freewheeling.”
