GOLDEN SPHINX BITS

From the Golden Sphinx Committee

It's time once again for this year's supplemental issue with all of last year's Golden Sphinx nominees. If you didn't solve them the first time around, now's your chance; if you did, enjoy a trip down memory lane.

The Enigma would be nothing without the puzzles contributed by all of you. Each month, you can help recognize the constructors by giving kudos (and one bang) to individual puzzles; we report these kudos, along with the solving statistics, a few months later. In 2015, we started a new tradition: we honor your favorite puzzles in each category at the "Golden Sphinx" awards at the Con banquet, presented by the Editor. The winners receive Golden Sphinx pins (see page 17 for the graphic) to commemorate the occasion.

Our starting point in most categories is to collect the puzzles that received the most kudos and bangs. (In 2023, we only published six cryptics, so all six are reprinted here.) Now, it's your turn: look over the nominees and vote for your favorites. This year, we'll be using ranked-choice voting; see the instructions below for more details. The winners will be announced first at Con, and then in *The Enigma*.

First and foremost, we'd like to thank all those who contributed puzzles in 2023: these submissions have been the heart of the NPL for over 140 years. Thank you also to yodaughter, who does the layout for this special issue; to Btnirn and the subeditors, who helped prepare these puzzles; to /dev/joe for compiling kudos counts; and to Qoz for facilitating online voting.

From the Compositor

Puzzles types are presented in roughly the same order as in *The Enigma*. The puzzles themselves are laid out so as to fit the space and do not reflect any particular ranking. In each regular issue, cryptograms are on the back page, sorted by estimated difficulty, and they are presented that way here.

VOTING INSTRUCTIONS

This year's Golden Sphinx voting will use ranked-choice voting. Instead of picking one favorite in each category, you can pick multiple favorites and rank them. If your first choice isn't sufficiently popular, your vote can be reassigned to your second-choice candidate, or your third, as appropriate. In elections with many candidates, RCV reduces the impact of many similar candidates taking votes from each other and increases the chance of a consensus choice being selected. Abstentions are possible and you do not need to vote in every category if you don't want to.

If voting online, you'll need to log in to the puzzlers.org website and go to www.puzzlers.org/sphinxes.

If you don't want to vote online, please write a list of the nominee(s) you are voting for, along with the categories, and mail the list to Sue++ (Susan Glass, 12 Shady Ln, Framingham MA 01701). Please be sure to include your nom so that we can verify the vote.

The deadline for voting by either method is June 30, 2024, midnight Pacific time; for mail-in votes this means the ballot must be postmarked by then. Only members who joined prior to June 1, 2024, are eligible to vote.



## Oct X-1. 100 IN GEOMETRY — BY BARTOK, LA HABRA CA

For the edification of someone well-known who was caught on camera flubbing it, here's an illustration of the Pythagorean Theorem, with the square of a hypotenuse (100) clearly equal to 36+64. In one straight line in the filled diagram, you'll see (in some order) who this is and what was sought at the time. The 10-Grid has three unclued entries at right angles. Two of them are individuals (one name contains a prominent right angle) sharing a connection. One of them was present when the error was made. Actually, so was someone among this grid's clued entries, and the final unclued entry describes him and suggests why he didn't speak up at the time.

The 6-Grid is a double word square with wordplay-only clues ordered alphabetically. The missing definitions appear instead, in correct order (with Acrosses preceding Downs), as extraneous words, one in each Across clue for the 8-Grid.


## Jul X-1. CLASSICAL ORDERS — BY HASSETT, WAYNE PA

Rows of this puzzle contain two entries, clued in order from left to right. Columns also contain two entries, and in addition, each is designed in one of the three classical orders of Ancient Greek architecture.

- Doric, the simplest of the orders: Entries are entered normally, and clued in order (from top to bottom).
- Ionic, noted for its spiraling volutes: Entries begin in a row to be determined, and upon reaching the bottom of the column, wrap around to the top.
- Corinthian, the most elaborate order: Entries are anagrammed into new valid words prior to entry, and are clued in order.

Architecture styles are divided evenly among the twelve columns.

Finally, each column contains a single letter which is not used by the corresponding crossing entry. These letters may appear anywhere within or between Across entries. From left to right, these letters reveal a location famous for its many columns.




